

When Judgment Gives Way to Joy
Zephaniah 3:9-20

The Scripture repeats that God, the righteous judge, will execute _____ judgments from time to time in this life, but each only _____ a final, eternal judgment. It is the greatest underlying, _____ fear of all: death, the grave, and judgment.

Zephaniah proclaimed God's coming judgment. It is coming because God created human beings in His _____—that is, with a capacity to have a relationship with Him characterized by _____ and expressed in worship and devotion to His _____.
