So, You Want a Miracle John 10:22-26 & 14:8-14

Is the fact that God miraculously answer every prayer we pray proof that the Christian faith is a?
In John 14, Jesus promised that His followers would do works than He did, and that if we pray in His name, Jesus will do it. The will help us understand this promise.
At this point Jesus' miraculous ministry and amazing teachings were well-known in even though most of His ministry had been in In John 10, we see that, despite all these miracles, most people in Jerusalem still demanded to convince them. Then, in John 14, we learn that His own struggled to believe He was who He said He was.
What should we take from this promise of doing greater works and of having our prayers answered? Another question will provide an answer: "Why do we to promises like this and others like, "Everyone who desires to live godly in Christ Jesus will persecution," or "My grace is sufficient for you for my power is made perfect in?"
Because we mostly desire miracles to persecution or suffering or weakness. But Jesus said that our prayers will be answered when we pray in Jesus' name, as His, so, for things that benefit Him, His, and in the world.
