When Failure Forces a Detour Exodus 2:11-22 & 3:7-10

Have you ever made a mistake from which you thought you would never <u>recover</u>? Because our God is a God of restoration, 2nd chances, and redemption, your failures don't have to be <u>final</u>. The backstory of Moses and the Exodus offers proof. Raised as a prince of Egypt, one mistake interrupted his life plans but initiated a <u>God</u>-guided sequence of events that led to Moses' future success.

Moses spent <u>40 years</u> tending his father-in-law's sheep in the Midian wilderness. Then one day on a mountain in a <u>distant</u> region of that wilderness, God spoke to him from a burning bush.

Moses, a <u>dejected</u> goatherd on the far side of a foreign wilderness due to one bad act was now being <u>deputized</u> by God to carry out a massive and monumentally difficult refugee extraction that would free an entire people group from the unyielding grip of the greatest <u>superpower</u> of that day.

Though Moses likely felt like <u>damaged goods</u>, God had a plan for him. After all, God causes <u>all things</u> to work together for the good of those who love Him. God used Moses' <u>self-inflicted detour</u> to set the table for his future success.

The Pharaoh with a personal vendetta against Moses had <u>died</u>. Moses <u>matured</u>, married, and had a son. The Israelites felt Pharaoh's brutality so intensely they were ready to take great <u>risks</u> to gain their freedom. Above all, Moses went from <u>prideful</u> prince to <u>humble</u> herdsman. God opposes the proud but gives grace to the humble. Humility qualified Moses.

The story of Moses' failure, along with the interruption it caused, speaks volumes to us. God's <u>sovereignty</u> combined with His <u>goodness</u> and <u>grace</u> seen even more clearly in the <u>cross</u> of Jesus, means that even when you fail and are forced to endure seemingly detrimental detours, God will make good use of these ingredients for your <u>good</u> and His <u>glory</u>.
